Transcription

Deepak Jayaraman (DJ): One if the things we explore in the podcast is how people get shaped in their earlier years we are a function of our context so going back to your childhood and reflecting and may be on the first ten fifteen years Falguni I'd love to get a sense of what are the few formative experience or events that have shaped you as a person and defined who you are today?

Falguni Nayar (FN): I think, I never thought my childhood would special till more recently as I think back I think my childhood was quite special, my parents gave me a lot of freedom to pursue a lot of travel and also brought a spirit of adventure in me and I think there were no cannot do's in their book. If I wanted to go trekking, if I wanted to travel alone, if I wanted to go on an exchange program and stay with a family in Kashmir. All of that I was allowed to do that and I think a lot of that shaped my attitudes and when I think about it the whole... to learn more, to travel more, also to a little bit of a boldness to be able to do it alone also a little bit of spirit of adventure to not fear anything I think all that has come from my childhood and I am extremely thankful to my parents. Both mom and dad to have brought me up like that. Now I do realize it was very unique.

DJ: And just to get some context, you had siblings it gives us the nature of the family grew up?

FN: So, we were a very small family of four, mom, dad, my brother and me. My brother was little bit younger than me. And another unique thing was that my dad always treated me like an equal and it was never like girls don't study so much? Girls shouldn't get anything and inheritance I think one of his early bee in his bonnet was that everything I have will go equally to my son and to my daughter and all those really made me feel like an equal. Really there was nothing that was holding me back and I didn't realized at that point but it was really unique so today when I think back I think I probably owe a lot to my dad.

VB: "all the right brain stuff of theatre and dance and poetry etc. I got from my mother who was a reader very interested in these other dimensions of life"

VB: "you know as a family, we could talk about anything and you could have very strong disagreements with your parents and I had many of them. No subject was taboo and we believed in open conversations. It was a little messy, sometimes a little loud, but that's the way we grew up. That also stayed with me through my working career. Whenever things have been uncomfortable or I have disagreed with them, I've had open conversations."

DJ: and Anu Madgavkar (AM)

AM: "the second principal again they instilled in me was to say that It doesn't matter what you do but you have to find what you want to do and then really work hard at doing it well, I think I grew up in a system in those days for most of us I think Engineering and Medicine were the only two really respected career choices and if you didn't do those then you were considered not so smart or not so academically superior"
